"Reason teaches us this truth. The very nature of love disposes a man to all proper acts of respect to both God and man. No other encouragement is needed. Love will dispose us to honour, worship, believe, and obey God. Love disposes us to act like a child toward our heavenly Father. A soul that loves God will delight to see self abased and God exalted.

Toward our fellow-man, love disposes us to every good behavior, such as honesty, meekness, gentleness, and mercy. Love will keep us from enmity, cruelty, and selfishness. "Love worketh no ill to his neighbour" (Rom. 13:10). It disposes us to fulfill our God-given duties in all our earthly callings and relationships. God's love is transforming power

Leon Morris: THE PERFECTING OF LOVE

God's love has its effects. We have just noticed that it means triumph, a triumph sometimes expressed in the life the beloved believer lives here and now.86 "Truly the love of God is perfected in anyone who keeps his word" (I John 2:5). P160

Morris citing a footnote in reference to a statement by Ethelbert Stauffer:

TDNT, I, 47. For "released" I would prefer "created"; this kind of love is never regarded as pent-up in man and simply awaiting an outlet. Cf. T. W. Manson: "A new power has come into human life from heaven, a new insight into life is ours, a new attitude to God and man has become part of our nature. And what effects this change is the love of God. Love is no longer a laborious business of doing the right thing by your neighbour:

it is a new spirit in which you approach him and it finds out its own way of treating him" (On Paul and John, London, 1963, p. 106).

Love is motivation for our growing in godliness. Love never fails because God is love without beginning or ending and He cannot fail.

And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to His purpose. For those whom He foreknew He also predestined to be conformed to the image of His Son, in order that He might be the firstborn among many brothers. And those whom He predestined He also called, and those whom He called He also justified, and those whom He justified He also glorified. What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare His own Son but gave Him up for us all, how will He not also with Him graciously give us all things?

Rom 8:28-32

Leon Morris also wrote:

"There are some relevant passages in the Pastorals. Paul the persecutor found mercy when "the grace of our Lord superabounded with faith and love in Christ Jesus" (1 Tim. 1:14). The God who saved Paul so strikingly brought good gifts to all Christians. He did not give them "a spirit of cowardice, but of power and love and a sound mind" (2 Tim. 1:7). This love is the principal goal of His purpose for them: "Now the aim of the commandment is love, proceeding out of a pure heart and a good conscience and a genuine faith" (I Tim. 1:5). This emphasis is made personal for Timothy in a number of places. Paul commends the young man for having followed Paul's teaching and other things, but specifically for "following" his love (2 Tim. 3:10). And more than once he exhorts Timothy to pursue desirable qualities, specifically mentioning love (I Tim. 6:11; II Tim. 1:13; 2:22). Timothy is also exhorted to be a model for the believers in a number of ways, specifically in his exercise of love (I Tim. 4:12). There is no substitute for love in a pastor.

Again: "And when we pour out our love on others, our concern is for them, not for ourselves, and we are not afraid. Similarly, we read, "God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but of power and love and

sobermindedness" (2 Tim. 1:7). Because God's love helps us rise above our own petty concerns, we are freed from fear."

Love for Christ is the power of our sanctification

Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling; for it is God who is at work in you, both to desire and to work for His good pleasure.

Phil 2:12-13

whoever follows His word, in him the love of God has truly been perfected. By this we know that we are in Him. 1 John 2:5

His divine power has granted to us all things that pertain to life and godliness, through the knowledge of Him who called us to His own glory and excellence, by which He has granted to us His precious and very great promises, so that through them you may become partakers of the divine nature, having escaped from the corruption that is in the world because of sinful desire.

God's love is our eternal security

Again from Leon Morris:

"Sometimes the outcome of God's sovereign love is the main idea as the writer contemplates the impossibility of anyone resisting God's purposes. Perhaps the outstanding passage illustrating this idea is the one in which Paul assures the Romans that "in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us." He goes on to maintain that there is no force that "will be able to separate us from the love of God

which is in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom. 8:37, 39),85 God's love triumphs.

Footnote 85 Charles Hodge exults in the security that this promises: "How wonderful, how glorious, how secure is the gospel! Those who are in Christ Jesus are as secure as the love of God, the merit, power, and intercession of Christ can make them. They are hedged around with mercy. They are enclosed in the arms of everlasting love" (The Epistle to the Romans, p. 293).

No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us. For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Rom 8:37-39

God's love is will power

What we love is the power that exercises our will. Will power is nothing without love. If we love we will seek to please God. If what we say we love is not what the will desires, then our words cannot produce the goods we claim to want. We cannot love the world and God.

What the will loves it will work to possess. What it desires it will possess and will deny whatever gets in the way. "Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives, and he who seeks finds, and to him who knocks it will be opened."

Matt 7:7-8

Jonathan Edwards teaches us about Love in 'The experience that counts' "True religion consists mainly in emotions"

"Who can deny that true religion consists mainly in emotions in vigorous and energetic actions of the will? The religion which God requires does not consist in weak, dull and lifeless wishes, raising us only a little above apathy. In His word, God greatly insists that we be serious, spiritually energetic, and our hearts vigorously involved in Christianity.

We must be 'fervent in spirit, serving the Lord' (Rom. 12:11). "And now, O Israel, what does the LORD your God require of you, but to fear the LORD your God, to walk in all His ways and to love Him, to serve the

LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul?' (Deut. 10:12). 'Hear, O Israel: the LORD our God, the LORD is one! You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your might' (Deut. 6:4-5)"

Again: "True religion is powerful, and its power first appears in the heart. This is why Scripture calls true religion 'the power of godliness', as distinct from outward appearances which are only its form- 'having a form of godliness, but denying its power' (2 Tim. 3:5). The Holy Spirit is a Spirit of powerful holy emotion in real Christians. This is why Scripture says that God has given us a spirit of power and of love and of a sound mind' (2 Tim. 1:7). When we receive the Holy Spirit, Scripture says that we are baptized 'with the Holy Spirit and fire' (Matt. 3:11). This 'fire' represents the holy emotions which the Spirit produces in us, so that our hearts 'burn within us' (Luke 24:32)"

Again: "However, every true Christian's emotions towards God are stronger than his natural or sinful emotions. Every genuine disciple of Christ loves Him above 'father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, yes, and his own life also' (Luke 14:26).

God who created us has not only given us emotions, but has made them very much the cause of our actions. We do not make decisions or act, unless love, hate, desire, hope, fear, or some other emotion, influences us. This applies in both secular and spiritual affairs. It is why many people hear God's Word telling them about infinitely important things - about God and Christ, sin and salvation, heaven and hell - and yet it makes no change in their attitude or behaviour. The reason is simple: what they hear does not affect them. It does not touch their emotions. Indeed, I boldly claim that no spiritual truth ever changed a person's attitude or conduct, unless it aroused his emotions. No sinner ever hungered for salvation, no Christian ever awoke from spiritual coldness, unless the truth affected his heart. The emotions are as important as that!"

Again: "the divine nature and essence does subsist in love." "If we love one another, God lives in us, and His love is perfected in us" and God "abides in us, by the Spirit that He has given us" (1 John 3:24, also 4:13).

Jonathan Edwards. "True religion is summed up in love."

"Love is the chief of all the emotions. This is what Jesus taught when someone asked Him what the greatest commandment was, "You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind." This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it: "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets' (Matt. 22:37-40).

The apostle Paul taught the same: 'love is the fulfilment of the law' (Rom. 13:10). "The purpose of the commandment is love from a pure heart' (1 Tim. 1:5). In 1 Corinthians 13 Paul speaks of love as the greatest thing in Christianity, the essence and soul of it, without which the greatest knowledge and gifts and actions are all worthless.

This clearly proves that true religion lies mainly in our emotions. For love is not just one of the emotions, but the chief of them and (so to speak) the fountain of the others. It is from love that hatred arises - hatred of the things which are contrary to what we love. From a vigorous, affection- ate, and fervent love of God will arise the other spiritual emotions; a hatred of sin; a fear of displeasing God: gratitude to God for His goodness; joy in God when we experience His presence; sorrow when we feel His absence; hope for a future enjoyment of God; zeal for God's glory. In the same way, love for our fellow men will produce every other right feeling towards them."

Jonathan Edwards 'Love and its fruits'

But now faith, hope, and love remain, these three; but the greatest of these is love.

1 Cor.13.13

"All Christian love is one as to its principle. About whatever object it is exercised, it is the same spring and fountain in the heart though it may flow out towards diverse objects. And therefore all is fitly comprehended under one name, even that of "charity," (*love*) as it is in the text. That Christian love is one in its principle, to whatever objects it flows out, appears by the following things."

1. "It is all from the same Spirit influencing the heart. It is from the breathings of the same Spirit that the Christian's love arises, both towards

God and men. The Spirit of God is a spirit of love. And therefore when the Spirit of God enters into the soul, love enters. God is love, and he who has God dwelling in Him by His Spirit will have love dwelling in him. The nature of the Holy Spirit is love; and it is by communicating Himself, or His own nature, that the hearts of the saints are filled with love or charity. Hence the saints are said to be "partakers of the divine nature" (2 Pet. 1:4). And Christians love is called the love of the Spirit. "Now I beseech you, brethren, for the Lord Jesus Christ's sake, and for the love of the Spirit" (Rom. 15:30). And having bowels of love and mercy seems to signify the same thing with having the fellowship of the Spirit in Philippians 2:1, "If there be therefore any consolation in Christ, if any comfort of love, if any fellowship of the Spirit. if any bowels and mercies." It is the Spirit which infuses' love to God. "The love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost" (Rom. 5:5). And it is by the indwelling of this Spirit that the soul dwells in love to men. "If we love one another, God dwelleth in us, and His love is perfected in us. Hereby know we that we dwell in Him, and He in us, because He hath given us of His Spirit" (1 John 4:12-13). And, "And this is his commandment, that we should believe on the name of His Son Jesus Christ, and love one another, as He gave us commandment. And he that keepeth His commandments dwelleth in Him, and He in him. And hereby we know that He abideth in us, by the Spirit which He hath given us" (1 John 3:23-24).

2. "Christian love to both God and men is wrought in the heart by the same work of the Spirit. There are not two works of the Spirit of God, one to infuse a spirit of love to God and another a spirit of love to men. But in doing one He doth the other. The Spirit of God in the work of conversion renews the heart by giving it a divine temper. "And be renewed in the spirit of your mind" (Eph. 4:23). And it is the same divine temper which is wrought in the heart that flows out in love both to God and men."

Again: "True affections stem from the illuminating influence of God on the will and acknowledge the unparalleled merit of all things pertaining to God. True affections balance certainty of conviction with humble response to the awesome majesty of God. The result is that true affections will actually lead to change in one's nature. Because affections are grounded in God, it is natural that true affections will cause one to be more like God. Therefore, affections facilitate one's sanctification".... "The change in one's nature resulting from the affections leads to change in one's behavior."

God's Love gives sight to the blind

"But when He, the Spirit of truth, comes, He will guide you into all the truth; for He will not speak on His own, but whatever He hears, He will speak; and He will disclose to you what is to come. He will glorify Me, for He will take from Mine and will disclose to you. All things that the Father has are Mine; this is why I said that He takes from Mine and will disclose to you."

'And though you have not seen Him, you love Him, and though you do not see Him now, but believe in Him, you greatly rejoice with joy inexpressible and full of glory."

1 Pet 1:8

His love reveals what is not like Christ in us so we can put it off.

His love desires we love one another as we are loved by God.

The more we cherish and desire Christ, the more we will be transformed into His image.

The more we love God the more God will give us the desire of our hearts.

In order to see more of the glory of Christ, are we willing to count all as loss that we love in the world in order to gain Him in the fullness of joyful fellowship?

The Love of God is the power to love as He loves

Therefore: We receive the power to love from the Spirit of Love. because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us. For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly.

Rom 5:5-6

Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. To know God is to have communion with God. To have communion with God is to have communion with His children. that which we have seen and heard we proclaim also to you, so that you too may have fellowship with us; and indeed our fellowship is with the Father and with His Son Jesus Christ. "This is My commandment, that you love one another, just as I have loved you." "This I command you, that you love one another."

"The Psalmist confesses, "My feet were almost gone: my steps had well nigh slipt: for I was envious at the foolish when I saw the prosperity of the wicked," (Psalm lxxiii. 3, 4;) and he found no resting-place until he entered the sanctuary, and considered the latter end of the righteous and the wicked. To conclude in one word, the cross of Christ then only triumphs in the breasts of believers over the devil and the flesh, sin and sinners, when their eyes are directed to the power of His resurrection."

John Calvin 'A little book on the Christian life'

"THERE IS NO more certain or reliable path for us than contempt of this present life and meditation on heavenly immortality. Two principles follow from this, in order that those who use this world might not be affected by it. First, let those who have wives live as though they had none; let those who buy live as though they did not buy (1 Cor. 7:29, 31). Paul teaches this. Let believers learn to bear scarcity with no less calm

and patience than they experience abundance-all with moderation. The one who seeks to hold on to the things of this world lightly puts to death his own immoderate appetite for food and drink. He puts to death cowardice, ambition, pride, haughtiness, and dissatisfaction with respect to his table, his buildings, and his clothes. Indeed, he puts to death him every care and affection which might lead him astray or hinder his meditation on heavenly life and his zeal for the improvement of his soul."

"AS A SECOND principle, those who have few possessions must learn to endure patiently their humble circumstances, not becoming agitated with excessive longing after things. Those who keep this rule have made much progress in the school of our Lord, but those who haven't give little proof that they are disciples of Christ. Indeed, numerous vices accompany the longing for earthly possessions. Besides, the one who cannot bear poverty is most likely to exhibit the opposite vice in the midst of prosperity. For example, the one who blushes over his cheap clothes will take pride in his expensive ones. The one unsatisfied with his simple meal, fidgeting with desire for something more significant, will abuse better foods by his lack of self-restraint."

Jonathan Edwards: 'Heaven is a world of love' Under the heading: The excellent circumstances of love in heaven.

1. Love in heaven is always mutual. It is always met with answerable returns of love; with returns that are proportioned to its exercise. Such returns, love always seeks; and just in proportion as any person is beloved, in the same proportion is his love desired and prized. And in heaven, this desire of love, or this fondness for being loved, will never fail of being satisfied. No inhabitants of that blessed world will ever be grieved with the thought that they are slighted by those that they love or that their love is not fully and fondly returned.

As the saints will love God with an inconceivable ardency of heart and to the utmost of their capacity, so they will know that He has loved them from all eternity, still loves them, and will continue to love them forever. And God will then gloriously manifest Himself to them, and they shall know that all that happiness and glory that they are possessed of are the fruits of His love. And with the same ardor and fervency will the saints

love the Lord Jesus Christ; and their love will be accepted, and they shall know that He has loved them with a faithful, yea, even with a dying love. They shall then be more sensible than they now are what great love it manifested in Christ that He should lay down His life for them; and then will Christ open to their view that great fountain of love in His heart for them, beyond all that they ever saw before. Hereby the love of the saints to God and Christ is seen to be reciprocated and that declaration fulfilled, "I love them that love Me" (Prov. 8:17); and though the love of God to them cannot properly be called the return of love, because He loved them first, yet the sight of His love will, on that very account, the more fill them with joy, admiration, and love to Him.

The principle of love itself in heaven

Jonathan Edwards 'Love and its fruits'

First, the nature of this love is altogether holy and divine. Much of what we call love now is carnal and proceeds from corrupt principles and motives or is directed to corrupt ends. But the love of heaven is spiritual, directed by holy motives to holy ends. The love of heaven is a love for God's sake and for the sake of the relation that persons have to Him.

Second, the degree of this love is perfect. God's love is perfect, and the love of others in heaven is perfect as far as their capacity as creatures is concerned. There is no pride or selfishness to hinder love in heaven, no enmity, no envy, no contempt. The love of benevolence finds delight in beholding the happiness of another, and the love of complacence finds delight in beholding the beauty and perfection of another. It will not be a grief to any saint to see those that are higher than himself in holiness and that are most loved by others, for he will rejoice with them with a benevolent love. Every man shall be perfectly satisfied with God and with his own personal measure of glory. The most glorious shall be the most humble, so that pride can find no place to occupy. The least glorious will not be envious, due to the fact that those above them are more humble. With perfect love in every soul, there simply cannot be any spiritual class warfare in heaven."

Growing in the knowledge of God results in increased love

We should always be asking the Holy Spirit to reveal to us in the Holy Scripture the Beauty and the Majesty and the Glory of God; Father, Son and Spirit. We can also benefit from reading some of the wisdom of the saints past and present who walked this path before us.

True love of God is outgoing, for love is first of all freely given. Love must be given without expecting to be loved in order to be received. In this way love is selfless, because its purpose is the cherishing of others. If the purpose we espouse isn't the greatest good of others, then it isn't God's love.

In this is love, not that we loved God, but that He loved us and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. No one has seen God at any time; if we love one another, God abides in us, and His love is perfected in us.

1 John 4:10-12

Crying about not being loved only proves we don't know that love is sacrificially giving ourselves for the good of others. Only lovers know God. Love is compelling and overcomes inertia.

Greater love has no one than this, that one lay down his life for his friends.

John 15:13

No one deserves God's love. Everyone deserves His judgment and condemnation. Love is the grace of God freely given to the undeserving. Therefore, we should love one another. But we cannot love unless we first know the love of God through His sacrifice of Christ His beloved Son on our behalf. Love is from God.

For the love of Christ controls us, having concluded this, that one died for all, therefore all died; and He died for all, so that they who live might no longer live for themselves, but for Him who died and rose again on their behalf.

2 Cor 5:14-15

You therefore, beloved, knowing this beforehand, be on your guard so that you are not carried away by the error of unscrupulous people and lose your own firm commitment, but grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. To Him be the glory, both now and to the day of eternity. Amen.

Since our salvation was determined before the creation of the world, through an eternal covenant between the Father and the Son; the whole of scripture declares the glory of God through the progressive revelation of salvations history, as Christ' love was being worked out on behalf of sinners like we once were. We can learn to love more by growing in the knowledge of Christ Jesus and His love for us.

Pray: that He would grant you, according to the riches of His glory, to be strengthened with power through His Spirit in the inner self, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith; and that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may be able to comprehend with all the saints what is the width and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ which surpasses knowledge, that you may be filled to all the fullness of God.
